PANEL ABSTRACT: The US DHHS - Health Resources and Services Administration, Special Projects of National Significance funded five HIV/AIDS demonstration projects to provide comprehensive services to Hispanic populations residing along the US/Mexico International Border. The panel presenters will identify the social and cultural issues that affect the delivery of HIV/AIDS medical care and services to this border population. The panel will also talk about the complexity in coordination of care for a population that is rural, transient, monolingual, and without immigration documentation. The presenters will identify special issues that will assist social workers in better understanding the needs of this population.
